# COVID-19 EU Briefing 20 July 2021

## Recovery

### **COVID-19 Treatment:**

- The European Medicines Agency <u>has started</u> evaluating an application to extend the use of Kineret (anakinra) to include treatment of COVID-19 in adult patients with pneumonia who are at risk of developing severe respiratory failure (inability of the lungs to work properly).
- EMA will communicate on the outcome of its evaluation, which is expected by October.

#### **Member States**

#### Belgium:

- Travelers entering Belgium from "high-risk" areas in the EU or Schengen, and who are not
  fully vaccinated will be required to take a PCR test on the first and seventh day after arrival. If
  the result is positive, they will be required to quarantine for 10 days. The day-one test is not
  necessary if the person took a PCR test in the 72 hours before their arrival on
- From 13 August, a 'COVID Safe Ticket' showing a person has been fully vaccinated, has antibodies from a recent infection, or a negative PCR test result within the past 48 hours will allow access to major events of more than 1,500 people outdoors. Those fulfilling the criteria will not be required to wear a mask or keep safe distancing.

## France:

• The government <u>altered</u> its new plan to fight COVID-19 on Monday, slashing planned fines and postponing them to an unspecified date, spokesman Gabriel Attal said. The planned 45,000 euro fine for businesses which do not check that clients have a health pass will be much lower, starting at up to 1,500 euros and increasing progressively for repeat offenders.

## Lithuania:

- The <u>following</u> countries and areas are now part of the red and grey category: Denmark,
  Greece (without including Corfu, Kefalonia, Thasos, Zakynthos, Rhodes, and Santorini),
  Spain (including Tenerife, Gran Canaria, and Mallorca), Cyprus, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg,
  Malta, Netherlands, Portugal (excluding Madeira), French regions: Martinique, French
  Guiana, and Réunion and Switzerland.
- All arrivals from the red/grey category must present a negative COVID-19 test result and stay self-isolated for ten days, if unvaccinated

# Finland:

- Finland will <u>open</u> its borders to fully vaccinated travellers who can present a valid and authorised COVID-19 Vaccination Passport, starting from 26 July
- The opening hours of land border crossing checkpoints with Norway are extended to 24 hours, starting July 19
